Our community across the world is facing a challenge with the emergency health crisis that is known as Coronavirus (COVID-19).

On the morning of Wednesday March 18, 2020, Prime Minister Scott Morrison addressed the nation announcing tougher restrictions on non-essential meetings and venues.

Following that address, our meeting venue the Gawler Arms Hotel, advertised on their Facebook page that the restrictions would apply to their venue <u>as a whole</u>. That is, no more than 100 people across the entire venue, including staff.

We have been fortunate to use the room at Gawler Arms with no room hire charge. The number of members paying for meals downstairs has been noted as quite low compared with those who attend the meeting in the room – and well before this crisis emerged. We certainly don't want to do the Gawler Arms a disservice by having more of us there not eating/drinking when there could be more paying customers wanting to eat/drink.

I'm sure you'll agree that the health and well being of our members and families is of the highest priority right now.

As President, I sought feedback from the club's board of directors and the majority has agreed that meetings should be deferred for the time being. Several events in our local area have been cancelled as a result of the crisis, including the ANZAC Day commemorative service, Relay for Life, the Caravan & Camping Swap Meet and our Quiz Night originally scheduled for May.

With that in mind, we will be taking a recess, a holiday of sorts, with the intention of returning to meetings, subject to a review of health and government regulations, on the first Tuesday of May 2020.

Our weekly club bulletin will continue to be sent out to keep our connections going and for further important announcements. Please update our bulletin editor Greg Morris with what's happening in your life - feel free to send photos and videos! Just because we're not seeing each other in person each week doesn't mean that we can't communicate. Technology provides us with many opportunities to engage.

Working together, our community can find a way through this. We'll be back soon and doing good in the community again. As we work through this crisis, I encourage you to visit our small businesses - help them through this because they are going to need the community support more than ever before. So since I arrived in Germany, there are many new weather phenomenon's that I haven't had the opportunity to experience before. For example, only this week there was a hurricane! Also, I have seen some snow and I

rode my bike to school in the strongest wind I've ever seen, it knocks you off your bike!

Anyway, lots has happened other than the weather, this month I started school, the first week I was here. The system is extremely different and even now I'm still adjusting to how it works. We don't have to wear a uniform, if you don't have a lesson you can go home, lunch goes for an hour and twenty minutes and the lessons are so long! Each lesson goes for one and a half hours!! Sometimes I'm at school until 5:30pm- involuntarily.

Currently, the hardest thing I'm dealing with is the language, I have an hour tutoring session every night and I also do another half an hour daily online. I'm still struggling but am understanding more.

I'm very excited for the Eurotour in April, I've met some other students that have been here since the middle of last year and they will be on the same trip as me. I am most excited to see, France, Spain and Italy. I am also hoping to gain permission to go to England to see some of my family around July.

I have a wonderful host family; they really support me and encourage me to go out and explore. I have a 13-year-old host sister who is gradually warming up to me, so I would say all is going well.

The host club is slightly less interested in me but I'm continuing to work on my relationship with them.

I have joined a roller-skating club and am looking into working with some horses near where I am living. There is a big swimming centre nearby with a water slide, when it warms up, I can't wait to try it out.

I have been into Stuttgart, which is the closest city to Filderstadt, quite a few times. There's always something new and interesting to see. I tried my first Starbucks coffee and been into famous stores that you can only gain access to from the internet in Australia.

I have days where I get quite homesick but the next day, I'm fine. To be honest I think I'm doing pretty good with that side of things. Apologies if this update seems informal, I have noticed that my English skills are getting worse and worse as I'm not practising them formally enough anymore. Although if it means gaining German as a whole new language then I'll settle.

Last Thursday, I went to the Mercedes's Benz factory where I went on a tour with the other exchange students in my district. There is seven of us, I also met the Inbound coordinator and some other Rotex members. It was the first rime meeting most if them. We are hoping to catch up again soon.

I ride my bike to school every morning, it's always very cold! My favourite lesson is Biology (because it's in English). On Tuesday we are dissecting an eye which I'm really looking forward to trying.
